SUBJECT: Letter of Opposition for AB 2975- Wild and Scenic Rivers

REQUEST(S):

That the Board of Supervisors:

Approve sending a letter of opposition for Assembly Bill 2975- Wild and Scenic Rivers

SUMMARY:

Tulare County is a member of the San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority (SJVWIA) with the objective of achieving development of the long-proposed Temperance Flat Reservoir project. This project, located on the San Joaquin River, would provide a vitally needed source of additional surface water storage that directly benefits residents and enterprises in Tulare County. A new dam would be constructed within the upper reaches of existing Millerton Lake to form the new reservoir. The new reservoir would have a capacity of 1.3 million acre-feet that would augment the local water supply. A vast amount of data collection, study, and planning has been invested in by State, Federal, regional, and local agencies. This investment culminated in the SJVWIA submitting an application to the California Water Commission in August 2017 for funding from the water bond (Proposition 1, Chapter 8) to help pay for Temperance Flat.

AB 2975 seeks to expand the scope of California's Wild and Scenic Rivers Act with potential adverse impacts on the State's water supply system, water supply development, water rights, and drought response. The authorities proposed by the bill could be used to obstruct the development of Temperance Flat's water storage capability, which is essential to addressing the San Joaquin Valley's current water crisis and new State groundwater sustainability mandates. Such obstruction would be

To Whom It May Concern:

The County of Tulare Board of Supervisors opposes Assembly Bill (AB) 2975, which seeks to expand the scope of California's Wild and Scenic Rivers Act with potential adverse impacts on the State's water supply system, water supply development, water rights, and drought response.

Tulare County is a member of the San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority (SJVWIA) with the objective of achieving development of the long-proposed Temperance Flat Reservoir project. This project, located on the San Joaquin River, would provide a vitally needed source of additional surface water storage that directly benefits residents and enterprise in Tulare County. A new dam would be constructed within the upper reaches of existing Millerton Lake to form the new reservoir, which would have a capacity of 1.3 million acre-feet. A vast amount of data collection, study, and planning has been invested in by State, Federal, regional, and local agencies. In August 2017, the SJVWIA submitted an application to the California Water Commission for funding under the water bond (Proposition 1, Chapter 8) to help pay for Temperance Flat.

The Tulare County Board of Supervisors believes AB 2975 could be used to obstruct the development of Temperance Flat's water storage capability, which is essential to addressing the San Joaquin Valley's current water crisis and new State groundwater sustainability mandates. Such obstruction would be to the detriment of the health and welfare of the Valley residents, businesses, and agriculture.
