SUBJECT:

Presentation from the Sheriff's Office on the in-car and body worn camera system.

REQUEST(S):

That the Board of Supervisors:

1. Receive a presentation to provide an overview of the Sheriff's Office in-car and body worn camera system and identify the overwhelming benefits it provides to the department, the County, and the community as a whole.

SUMMARY:

In 2013, Sheriff Boudreaux launched a pilot program installing twenty in-car camera systems in patrol vehicles. While innovative for its time, the program has since evolved to an in-car camera system in each and every patrol vehicle. Since the program's inception, Sheriff Boudreaux has also implemented body worn cameras on patrol deputies and was the first to introduce them to the Detentions Division.

The overall program allows for visual evidence on activities of both deputies and the public during law enforcement interactions. Video evidence has been considered an excellent source of providing an unbiased witness to a particular event. Police in-car and body worn camera video has helped law enforcement agencies establish a clear understanding of what occurred during a police event, which is vital to a department's veracity and public perception, and also improves prosecution and case resolution.

Sheriff Boudreaux continues to pursue strong community relationships through transparency, state of the art technology, and infrastructure to support the best

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service delivery from the Sheriff's Office to the residents of Tulare County.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING:

There will be no net County cost related to the presentation of the Axon camera system.

LINKAGE TO THE COUNTY OF TULARE STRATEGIC BUSINESS PLAN:

The County's five-year strategic plan includes the Safety and Security Initiative to effectively and fairly investigate arrest, prosecute and punish individuals who engage in criminal behaviors. The Sheriff's camera system will help fulfill this initiative because it will increase security, efficiency, and effectiveness in the investigation and prosecution of crime.
