Tulare County's Local Assistance for Tree Mortality Program Report

REQUEST(S):

That the Board of Supervisors:

- 1. Receive a presentation by the Tulare County Fire Department, regarding the Local Assistance for Tree Mortality Program; and
- 2. Authorize the Fire Chief to hire ten (10) additional Extra Help Seasonal Firefighters; and
- 3. Authorize the Fire Chief, or his designee, to procure Tree Mortality project related tools, equipment, and personal protective gear in an amount not to exceed \$31,000; and
- 4. Authorize the Fire Chief, or his designee, to provide safety training in an amount not to exceed \$24,000; and
- 5. Approve the necessary budget adjustments, per the attached AUD 308 (4/5ths vote required).

SUMMARY:

In February 6, 2018 the Board approved the Fire Department's participation in the Local Assistance for Tree Mortality Grant Program (LATM). The County has committed to perform \$2.2 million worth of tree mortality related fuel reduction

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activities to be performed with reimbursement for eligible costs via the California Disaster Assistance Act (FEMA funds) and CalFire funding provided by the Local Assistance for Tree Mortality grant program.

Tulare County and nine other Southern Sierra regions are currently faced with a large scale forest die-off as the result of drought and pine-bark beetle infestation, commonly known as "Tree Mortality." Tulare County continues to be the County with the highest number of dead and dying trees in California.

The Fire Department has successfully implemented the Local Assistance for Tree Mortality program over the last ten months and has removed 4,555 trees at a cost of \$201,308 or \$44 per tree as of November 10, 2018. Completed LATM-funded Tree Mortality project areas include Parker Pass and Ponderosa.

Tree removal activities that are reimbursable with CDAA/LATM funding have largely been performed by the County Fire Fuels Crew, a ten person team of Extra Help Seasonal Firefighters, dedicated to fuel reduction activities. These funding sources only allow reimbursement for activities performed by contractors or temporary workers. To date, the County has only engaged private tree fallers for the removal of extremely difficult or unusually dangerous hazard trees; the vast majority of grantfunded tree removal work has been performed by the Fuels Crew.

Given the immense amount of dangerous fuel loads that remain to be removed, and the proven efficiencies realized by utilizing the Fuels Crew, County Fire is requesting the formation of a second Fuels Crew in order to accomplish the hazard tree removals still needed to better protect mountain communities and forested areas. In order to maximize the use of available grant-funding for tree removals and to accelerate the scope and scale of safety-related fuels reduction, it is necessary to double the available Extra Help Seasonal Firefighter workforce.

Accordingly, it is respectfully requested that the Board of Supervisors receive this presentation by the Fire Department regarding progress made with the Local Assistance for Tree Mortality Program Report.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING:

This request requires \$55,000 from the General Fund to pay for equipment and safety training. The attached budget adjustment (AUD 308) provides the budget accounts to be utilized. All expenses will be incurred before December 2019 to meet grant requirements.

LINKAGE TO THE COUNTY OF TULARE STRATEGIC BUSINESS PLAN:

The County's five-year strategic plan includes the Safety and Security initiative. This action helps provide for the safety and security of the public by reducing hazardous fuels and increasing the protection of public infrastructure in the urban wild land interface.











- Tree Mortality Status in Tulare County

- State wide cost per tree \$570












Protecting Evacuation Routes Safety Rationale for Tree Mortality Projects









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

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Parker Pass - Mountain Road 50

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- Improved roadside safety for thousands of travelers and residents
- Successfully secured Parker Pass as a viable evacuation route
- Reduced the threat of wildfire to the community of Ponderosa
- Fuels Crew also assisted on a number of emergency incidents including a Technical Rescue of a minor
- Fuels Crew experienced only one reportable injury: 14,800 hours worked
- Under budget approximately \$285,692
- Average of thirty trees removed per day
- Fuels Crew Program has created an experienced workforce for future County Fire recruitment




