Authorize the submission of a grant application

REQUEST(S):

That the Board of Supervisors:

- 1. Authorize the submission of a grant application for a Federal Emergency Management Agency Fire Prevention and Safety Grant to purchase smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in the amount of \$5,500; and
- 2. Authorize the Fire Chief, or his designee, to sign and electronically submit the grant application.

SUMMARY:

The Tulare County Fire Department is proposing to request grant funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Fire Prevention and Safety Grant Program. The purpose of this grant request is to provide for the purchase of one-hundred (100) combination smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Obtaining this grant will allow the department to assist our Fire Prevention Division in disseminating these detectors to various rural communities throughout Tulare County.

Smoke alarms provide an early warning of a fire, giving people additional escape time. In 2013-2018, smoke alarms sounded in more than half (53%) of the homes reported to U.S. fire departments. If awarded this grant will serve to reduce the number of homes in Tulare County that do not currently have a smoke detector.

The grant request is \$5,500, with a county cost share of \$261, and will be awarded during Fiscal Year 2019/20. Grant related expenditures and revenues will be included in the Fiscal Year 2019/20 budget.

The County's five-year strategic plan includes the Safety and Security initiative. Approval to apply for the requested grant will support efforts to obtain necessary safety equipment for rural communities throughout Tulare County.

Tulare County has an area of 4,863 square miles and a population of 442,179. It is home to Mt. Whitney: the highest point in the contiguous United States (14,505) ft) and the General Sherman Giant Sequoia; the biggest tree in the world (274.9 tall x 102.6 wide). It is geographically diverse with a flat, fertile and extensively cultivated valley floor in the western half that has made it the nation's 2nd leading producer of agricultural commodities. The eastern half is home to the towering granite peaks, dense forests, wild rivers and chaparral foothills of the Sierra Nevada Range. The Tulare County Fire Department became an operation of the County on July 1, 2007. Prior to this date, fire services were provided through a contract with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CALFIRE). The County had been contracting for these services since 1927. The reason for terminating the contract was to decrease operational expenses by providing for fire and emergency services in-house with a direct labor force, rather than contracting from a third party. After 10 years as a County entity, the Tulare County Fire Department has successfully reduced its operating expenses. The Tulare County Fire Department serves the entire unincorporated area of the County and some areas of the incorporated cities through mutual aide agreements. Services provided to residents and visitors of Tulare County include: responding to fires, medical emergencies, motor vehicle accidents, technical rescues and other life threatening or dangerous conditions as the lead agency, or in support of that agency having jurisdiction. In an effort to minimize dangerous conditions, emergency situations and threats to life, property and the environment, the Department strives to maintain a comprehensive Community Risk Reduction and Fire Prevention Program that in addition to the traditional delivery of fire suppression service, includes fire protection planning, fire prevention education, fire law and code enforcement and fire suppression cost recovery. The Department also participates in fire protection service agreements that allow the Tulare County Fire Department to receive and deliver fire protection service assistance from, and to, cooperating agencies. The operational structure of the Tulare County Department is as follows: Fire Personnel (420) and Stations (28): Field personnel consist of 9 Shift Battalion Chiefs, 1 Administration Battalion Chiefs, 23 Fire Captains, and 49 Fire Lieutenants, 9 Fire Apparatus Engineers, and approximately 329 reserve supported by reserve firefighters. Fire personnel are responsible for emergency response readiness, pre-fire planning, fire prevention tasks, fire apparatus maintenance, station training, and station maintenance. Fire Personnel respond to fires, medical aids, traffic accidents, hazardous material incidents and rescue calls.



Emergency Fire Communications Center (FireComm): 8 fulltime employees and varying number of extra help dispatchers. FireComm personnel perform emergency dispatching services for the Tulare County Fire Department, Woodlake Fire Protection District, City of Farmersville FD, and City of Exeter FD. On an average year, FireComm dispatches approximately 14,000 incidents. The FireComm Facility Maintenance: 1 maintenance worker is responsible for the maintenance and repair of 28 fire stations, contracting with private vendors when necessary. The fire stations range in age from 8 to 55 years old. The median household income is \$39,499 with 30.1% of the population living in poverty. The largest ethnic groups are Hispanic (62.3%) followed by white (30.9%) and Asian (3.5%).

The Tulare County Fire Department has its own Fire Fund, and is not located within the General Fund; this is not typical in the Fire Industry. The fire department receives the majority of its budgetary funding through a fire tax, which is included in the county property tax allocation. Since the Great Recession, property values have continued to be stagnant, which drastically impacts our department; ability to meets its revenue goals for growth. Revenue distribution is as follows; 45% property tax, 40% county contribution, and 9% other sources. The expenditure outlays of the department are as follows; 72% salary and benefits, 15% interdepartmental charges, and 13% for departmental expenditures. Mandatory and uncontrollable costs to the department is 87% of the budgeted expenditures. Additionally, Tulare County does not have an equipment/appliance replacement fund, a vehicle replacement fund, nor a capital improvements program to assist in the funding of fire prevention equipment; all improvement and replacement activities must be taken directly from available funding. The department applies for various grants as they are made available. But with the over whelming grant competitiveness, our awards are minimal. At this time we do not have budget approval or funding availability to purchase the fire prevention items requested.

The Tulare County Fire Department was awarded a grant for the same purpose in 2012. The Department complied with all requirements of the grant and successfully completed the project. Engine crews went out into their communities and went door to door and installed smoke detectors.

The Department will analyze data from the County to determine which communities have the lowest income per capita. It will also determine which of those communities are considered to have an extended response time for the arrival of Fire Apparatus. Both of these criteria will enable the Department to decide where to distribute the detectors. Staff and Fire Station Personnel will contact residents in the area to determine if they would like to have a detector installed. The detectors will be given to those who respond first.

The Department will track all calls for service in the target area specifically for Structure Fires and Medical Aids. Incident Reports will be reviewed to determine if all occupants exited the structure prior to the arrival of the Fire Department for Structure Fires. Additionally, Incident Reports will be reviewed to determine if the occupants requested Emergency Medical Services for Carbon Monoxide poisoning. The extent of the Carbon Monoxide poisoning will determine the effectiveness of the detectors.
