

HOMELESSNESS IN TULARE COUNTY

Point-In-Time Homelessness In Tulare County



- Almost 30% increase in homelessness since 2015.
- 71% living unsheltered: on the street or another outdoor location, in a vehicle, in abandoned buildings, or encampments.

WHO IS HOMELESS?

- Schools report more than 3,000 kids were homeless in 2017-2018 school year.
- Since 2015, almost double the number of adults age 55+ who are homeless.
- 73% of men and 67% of women are living without shelter.
- More youth are living unsheltered than ever before.
- Over 1 in 5 homeless families with children are living without shelter.



HOMELESSNESS IN TULARE COUNTY

- Over 90% of homeless households had their last stable residence in Tulare County.
- 532 homeless adults with disabilities counted in the 2019 PIT – 244 chronically homeless.
- 64% have no financial resources, including public benefits.

Poverty and Unemployment


- Nearly 1 in 4 County families live below the federal poverty line (2017).
- Median County income is 33% less than the statewide average.

Rising Costs of Housing

- Rental costs continue to increase relative to wages.
- Median rents increased by 9% (2012 to 2017).
- One of four people indicated housing-related issues as their reason for homelessness (2019).

146 Permanent Supportive Housing beds added since 2012 (95% retention rate)



71 Rapid Rehousing beds added since 2012 (including bicounty SSVF)



100% of CoC and ESG program-funded projects are Housing First

SYSTEM CHALLENGES

- Lack of county-wide consensus
- No low-barrier shelter options anywhere in the county
- Many individuals require intensive services
- Resources are not tailored to needs or are underutilized
- Public misunderstandings about homelessness
- Few housing resources to meet the need
- Difficult to find units even when subsidies are available
- Transportation is limited

PRIORITIES ACROSS ALL GOALS



RECOMMENDED STRATEGIES FOR TULARE COUNTY

- Endorse the Countywide Strategic Plan as a shared roadmap for addressing homelessness in Tulare County.
- Partner with other jurisdictions to establish a centralized "backbone" structure to facilitate community-wide Strategic Plan implementation, coordinate county-wide communication and messaging.
- Continue process of enhancing alignment, accessibility, coordination of existing resources, in line with new funding streams and opportunities.
- Continue expanding partnerships to integrate service provision and expand programming -- HOPE Team, low-barrier shelters, PSH, mobilemultidisciplinary.
