## REQUEST(S):

That the Board of Supervisors:

Approve a letter of support for SB 1532 (Hueso) regarding biomethane procurement by gas corporations.

## SUMMARY:

Senate Bill 1532, introduced by Senator Ben Hueso, would require California gas companies, by January 1, 2030, to provide at least 20 percent of gas for residential and small-to medium-sized businesses from renewable sources. Southern California Gas Company has requested that the Tulare County Board of Supervisors support SB 1532. In addition to support from SoCalGas, SDG&E and PG&E also are supportive of this bill.

On May 7, 2019, Tulare County Board of Supervisors approved a resolution in support of balanced energy solutions that allowed the County to maintain local control. Key components of this resolution included the understanding of the need to mitigate the impacts of climate change, but with the flexibility to do so in a manner that best serves the needs of our residents and businesses. Additionally, the resolution supported diversification of energy delivery systems and resources to contribute to greater reliability and community resilience.

SB 1352 would help support the goals outlined in the balanced energy solutions resolution because it would require the Public Utilities Commission, in consultation with the State Air Resources Board, to establish a biomethane procurement program for California gas corporations. In 2015, methane contributed to about 9

percent of the state's GHG emissions and a majority of these emissions are derived from renewable resources such as solid waste, livestock manure, and wastewater. This procurement procedure outlined in SB 1532 would allow for gas corporations to utilize renewable resources to help de-carbonize households and commercial buildings which have show to be difficult areas to reduce emissions from.

Lastly, Tulare County's balanced energy resolution highlighted the need for clean, affordable and reliable energy to help attract and retain local businesses, create jobs, and spur economic development. The construction and ongoing operation and maintenance of biomethane facilities will require skilled labor on-site at dairies, wastewater treatment plants, and diverted organic waste facilities. Many of these facilities fall within communities identified as disadvantaged by the state, including those in Tulare County. Our County, and the San Joaquin Valley Region, will benefit from the increased economic activity associated with biomethane.

## FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING:

There is no Net County Cost to the General Fund.

## RE: SB 1352 (Hueso) Gas corporations: biomethane procurement SUPPORT

Dear Chair Hueso:

The Tulare County Board of Supervisors is in support of SB 1352 (Hueso) which would require California natural gas utilities to procure at least 20 percent of gas for residential and small-to medium-sized businesses from renewable resources.

In 2016, Senate Bill 1383 established a statewide goal of reducing methane emissions by 40% below 2013 levels by 2030. As roughly 80% of the methane emissions in California come from agricultural or solid waste sources, SB 1352 presents an enormous emissions reduction opportunity. In Tulare County, we understand the importance of responsibly reducing methane emissions due to the dairy production and processing being one of our largest industries and economic driver in the County. Many of our local dairies are already a part of the USDA Dairy Digester Research and Development Plan. Dairy digesters are a renewable technology that utilizes livestock manure to produce methane, which is then used as a renewable source of electrical energy generation and transportation fuel.

Utility procurement of biomethane has the potential to create in-state jobs and increase instate economic activity, especially for rural and agricultural regions such as Tulare County. The construction and ongoing operation and maintenance of biomethane facilities will require skilled labor on-site at dairies, wastewater treatment plants, and diverted organic waste facilities. Many of these facilities fall within communities identified as disadvantaged by the state, including those in Tulare County. Our County and the San Joaquin Valley Region will greatly benefit from the increased economic activity associated with biomethane technology.

For these reasons, we fully support SB 1352 and respectfully request your "Aye" vote.
