REQUEST(S):

through a grant from the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), within the Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice, to promote community awareness of crime victims' rights and services and to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the enactment of the U.S. Victims of Crime Act during 2009 National Crime Victims' Rights Week.

The week of April 26 – May 2, 2009, is National Crime Victims' Rights Week (NCVRW), which was first designated by President Ronald Reagan in 1981. This annual observance seeks to increase public awareness of, and knowledge among crime victims and survivors about the wide range of rights and services available to people who have been victimized by crime. The theme for 2009 National Crime Victims' Rights Week is "25 Years of Rebuilding Lives: Celebrating the Victims of Crime Act."

The Victims of Crime Act was enacted in 1984 to provide financial support for state crime victim compensation and victim assistance programs. The Act created the Crime Victims Fund through which more than \$9 billion has been collected from federal criminal fines and other penalties, instead of taxpayer dollars, to support victim services.

Through the provision of funding for Community Awareness Projects and its sponsorship of a Resource Guide to help victim assistance and allied professional organizations promote the Week, OVC seeks to increase general public understanding of crime victims' rights and concerns, and to educate crime victims and survivors about resources available to help them.

The District Attorney's project will include a victims' memorial quilt unveiling ceremony; a recognition ceremony for individuals and organizations that serve victims of crime; public service announcements; newspaper advertisements; and the publication of brochures, posters, and other materials.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING:

The total cost for the Program for Fiscal Year 2008/2009 is \$4,990. The AUD 308 is recognizing the \$4,990 grant allocation, and there is no impact to the County General Fund.

LINKAGE TO THE COUNTY OF TULARE STRATEGIC BUSINESS PLAN:

The County's five-year Strategic Business Plan and Management System include Safety and Security initiatives to provide for the safety and security of the public. The authorization to accept grant funding from the National Association of VOCA Assistance Administrators helps to fulfill this initiative by promoting victims' rights

National Crime Victims' Rights Week Community Awareness Project Subgrant Award Agreement

Subgrant Award No.: 09-06-115

This agreement between the National Association of VOCA Assistance Administrators ("NAVAA") and County of Tulare, District Attorney's Office ("Subgrantee") for funding of a National Crime Victims' Rights Week Community Awareness Project ('the project") under the 2009 National Crime Victims' Rights Week Community Awareness Project grant program ("NCVRW CAP") is subject to the terms and conditions below:

- 1. This agreement is subject to all of the terms and conditions, including the availability of funding, awarded to NAVAA pursuant to Grant No. 2006-VF-GX-K024 by the Office for Victims of Crime, Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice ("OVC").
- 2. The Subgrantee shall perform the services and activities described in the application submitted under the NCVRW CAP grant program which shall be considered incorporated into this agreement, unless and to the extent any changes, revisions or modifications are approved or required by NAVAA.
- 3. NAVAA shall reimburse the Subgrantee for the actual, reasonable and necessary costs incurred by the Subgrantee in connection with the project as contained in the Subgrantee's application, not to exceed \$4,990.00, unless and to the extent approved by NAVAA. All expenditures are subject to the requirements of the NCVRW CAP program and the regulations set forth in the current edition of the Office of Justice Programs' Office of the Chief Financial Officer Financial Guide (http://www.oip.usdoj.gov/financialguide/).
- 4. The Subgrantee agrees to retain for a period of at least three years from the end of this agreement and to make available on request to NAVAA, its agents or authorized agents of the U.S. Government all financial records, including adequate documentation of all expenditures and obligations made under this agreement. Reimbursement is subject to the submission by the Subgrantee of a satisfactory "After-Action Report/Reimbursement Request", as described in item No. 5.
- 5. The Subgrantee agrees to submit an After-Action Report/Reimbursement Request on a form provided by NAVAA. The After-Action Report/Reimbursement Request shall be submitted to NAVAA no later than June 30, 2009 and shall, at a minimum, include:
 - a. A narrative description of the project.
 - b. A list of all project co-sponsors and collaborative organizations and a brief description of their respective contributions to the project.
 - c. An enumeration of the type of public awareness materials developed, the number of each type produced and the number of each type actually distributed.
 - d. The number of press releases issued and/or media contacts made.
 - e. Documentation that the project was implemented (e.g. copies of news stories, photographs, press releases, etc.).
 - f. To the extent available, indicators of the reach or impact of the project (e.g. number of people attending an event).
 - g. Any discernible results or follow-up plans, including a discussion of the impact the project is believed to have had on the public's awareness of victims' rights.
 - h. Comments and feedback on the NCVRW CAP program and suggestions to improve the program.
 - i. Such other information as may reasonably be requested by NAVAA and/or OVC.
 - j. Request for reimbursement.

We are pleased to inform you that your application for 2009 National Crime Victims' Rights Week (NCVRW) Community Awareness Project (CAP) funding has been recommended by the National Association of VOCA Assistance Administrators (NAVAA) and approved by the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC). Your project was selected after careful consideration of 186 applications based on its efforts to raise public awareness about crime victims' rights and services available in your community and to commemorate 25 years of Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) accomplishments. NAVAA agrees to reimburse your project up to \$4,990.

To receive reimbursement for your approved expenses, your organization must implement your project in coordination with National Crime Victims' Rights Week, April 26-May 2, 2009, and then submit a final report of your project's activities and outcomes, including an itemized list of financial expenditures. The report and reimbursement request must be submitted to NAVAA **no later than June 30, 2009**. Copies of this form and instructions are available in a special Subgrantee section of the NCVRW CAP Web site (see later).

Please note that NAVAA will reimburse projects based on actual expenditures as contained in the approved budgets (or as modified), the guidelines related to this funding opportunity on the NCVRW Community Awareness Project Web site (http://cap.navaa.org), and the regulations set forth in the Office of Justice Programs' Financial Guide (http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/financialguide/). Please contact Project Director Chris Nolan at chris@navaa.org (or call her at 920-648-3451) if you need to make changes to the approved strategy or budget **no later than April 17, 2009**. Ms. Nolan will inform you whether your revisions are approved.

Please keep the following restrictions in mind as you plan your NCVRW Community Awareness Project:

- We cannot reimburse you for speaker or consultant fees that exceed \$450 per day for each individual. Supplemental funding from other sources cannot be used to exceed this daily limit.
- Food and beverages costs must be reasonable and associated with an awareness event that is
 open to the public. Costs associated with an event at which alcohol is served are not allowable.
- Prizes associated with contests, raffles, or drawings, including cash or gift cards, will not be reimbursed. A reasonable, modest amount may be expended for recognition awards, such as plaques or certificates.
- Costs associated with promotional items, such as pins and buttons, must be reasonable and directly tied to the 2009 NCVRW theme, "25 Years of Rebuilding Lives: Celebrating the Victims of Crime Act".
- Salary or organizational overhead costs will not be reimbursed.
- Costs related either directly or indirectly to lobbying activities are not allowable.

- Costs associated with organized fundraising, including financial campaigns, endowment drives, solicitation of gifts and bequests, and similar expenses incurred to raise capital or obtain contributions, cannot be reimbursed.
- You may not use or permit the use of the logo of the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Office for Victims of Crime except on materials that have received prior approval from OVC.
- You are encouraged to use the following or similar statement on appropriate products and materials produced and/or distributed under this subgrant:

"This project is supported by a 2009 National Crime Victims' Right Week Community Awareness Project subgrant awarded by the National Association of VOCA Assistance Administrators under a Victims of Crime Act grant from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Office for Victims of Crime."

Briefly describe lead organizatic mission with crime victims' issues and its perience in conducting public awareness activities. (500 words).

The mission of the Tulare County District Attorney's Office is to represent the people of the State of California in an efficient, effective, and ethical manner as an administrator of justice and a protector of the guarantees set forth in the Constitution of the State of California and the United States. We also participate in the life of our community, support appropriate efforts to prevent crime, provide opportunities for youth to make intelligent choices, and educate our citizens about the causes of crime and its impact on our quality of life and democratic system of self-government.

The Victim Witness Assistance Center was established in Tulare County in 1980. The Program came under the direction of the District Attorney's office in 1996, and continues to be the major provider of victim services in Tulare County. Our Victim Witness Assistance staff provide the following services to victims of crime and their family members: crisis intervention; emotional support; liaison between victim, police, prosecutor, and other agencies; orientation to the criminal justice system; court escort; case status information; property return information; community resource and referral counseling; and assistance in filling for financial reimbursement for losses incurred as a result of being injured or threatened with injury during a crime.

The District Attorney's Office administers several grant programs that help fund victim services and issues, including the following: Violence Against Women Vertical Prosecution, Elder Abuse Advocacy and Outreach, and Victim Witness Assistance. We also serve Spanish speaking victims through the Special Emphasis Victims Assistance Program. These programs are designed to include a full range of comprehensive services to victims of crime through a multi-agency approach.

The Victim Witness Assistance Center receives referrals from all local law enforcement agencies, as well as our own prosecuting attorneys, Child Protective Services, funeral homes, hospitals, rape crisis centers, and domestic violence shelters. Our staff makes referrals to other service providers, such as Family Services of Tulare County, organizations that provide temporary housing, and providers of medical and psychological services.

Our staff has extensive experience in organizing educational events and conducting public awareness activities. This includes making public presentations to a variety of groups, including law enforcement, community service groups, parent groups, doctors and nurses, and businesses. We also hold special events that increase public awareness, including the Victims' Memorial Quilt Unveiling Ceremony and candlelight vigils honoring victims of domestic violence. Victim Witness Assistance staff conduct outreach efforts, as well as display and present project materials, at the Child Abuse Conference, Migrant Education events, high schools, health fairs, County fairs, senior centers, and other locations throughout the community. The Kids' Court program helps children gain familiarity with the court environment, personnel, and processes, to prepare them for court appearances.

We have developed and disseminated a variety of brochures, which include the following topics: Victim Witness Bureau, Child Abuser Response Team, child abuse, domestic abuse, elder abuse, elder crime prevention, and preparing to testify. Additionally, we have developed press releases and public service announcements to increase public awareness.

SI TION 2: PROJECT DESCRIPTION

- a. Date(s) of funded activities: April 26 May 2, 2009 (promotion begin April 1)
- b. Describe specific NCVRW CAP activities or events for which grant funds are requested and the anticipated general public impact (500 words).

The goal of this project is to increase the general public's awareness and knowledge of the rights and services available to victims of all types of crime. Grant funding will allow for print media advertising, public service announcements, and radio spots, in both English and Spanish. These will be used to inform community members of events held during Victims' Rights Week, as well as services available. Candlelight vigils will also be held throughout the County, in conjunction with other organizations, to honor the victims of crime and their surviving family members.

Each year, the Victims' Memorial Quilt is unveiled during Victims' Rights Week in a special ceremony. This evening of dedication and remembrance includes testimonials from surviving family members. Victim Assistance Advocates also provide program information and literature. Grant funds will used to expand the event in order to increase the number of community members in attendance. This would require that the event be held in a larger facility, and that public awareness be increased through outreach and public service announcements. Last year, more than 250 community members attended, and each year the number has increased.

We will also facilitate a ceremony to recognize the programs and individuals who have gone above and beyond to assist victims of crime. This may include the following: community members and volunteers; service organizations; law enforcement individuals; businesses providing assistance with housing, utilities, food, and clothing; medical and mental health providers that donate their services; and funeral homes. Grant funding would pay for plaques and certificates of appreciation, the facility, and refreshments.

Victim Witness Advocates will conduct outreach efforts throughout the week at local malls, community colleges, high schools, senior centers, and other community events. This will include providing information, both verbally and in writing, on victims' services in both English and Spanish. Displays will be set up that include information on victims' rights, how to obtain services, and the results of Victim Witness programs. Statistics will be included to show the number of victims that experience and/or report different types of crime, and successful prosecutions. Stories will show how victims' services and compensation has helped local residents. We will highlight programs that receive VOCA grants, as well as the State victim compensation program, and promote awareness of services available to victims through local, state, and federal agencies. Grant funds will be used to create printed materials, such as flyers, brochures, and posters.

The rural County of Tulare covers 4,823 square miles. The population of Tulare County is approximately 421,553. Although outreach will occur county-wide, activities will largely take place in Visalia and Porterville, the two largest cities within the County. The recognition ceremony will be held in the city of Visalia, which has a variety of locations with meeting facilities.

The project will impact the general community at large, rather than a narrow or selected audience. All events and activities funded, in part or in whole, under this grant will be open to the public.

c. Describe the project's relationship to National Crime Victims' Rights Week including whether and how this project will be coordinated with other community NCVRW activities (200 words).

Although NCVRW week overlaps with other victim-related observances, this year funded project will only focus on NCVRW and this year's theme. Traditional events will be enhanced by creative and collaborative partnerships, which will be strengthened during the planning of Victims' Rights Week activities.

The projects funded through this grant will be directly related to, and activities will be held during, National Crime Victims' Rights Week. Our projects will be coordinated with other activities during the week, including those conducted by Family Services of Tulare County, which operates the battered women's shelter and the rape crisis response program. Other service providers will participate with our Victim Witness Advocacy staff in outreach efforts, as well as candlelight vigils. We will also invite representatives from other organizations to speak at our events during the week, which will increase awareness of the services that they provide.

Representatives from other organizations that provide services to victims and their family members will attend the Victims' Memorial Quilt Unveiling Ceremony held during Victims' Rights Week. Additionally, our Victim Witness Advocacy staff will attend other victims' memorial quilt unveiling ceremonies and candlelight vigils held in contiguous counties. This will allow us to network and increase collaboration.

The 2009 National Crime Victims' Rights Week theme and colors will be incorporated into all aspects of the project. They will be used to promote awareness of victims' rights and needs, as well as services available, and enhance general public awareness.

The theme, "25 Years of Rebuilding Lives: Celebrating the Victims of Crime Act", will be used to commemorate the Victims of Crime Act's significant contributions, which include funding for direct services to crime victims and other victim related activities. The theme will be used in all press releases, public services announcements, posters, and other printed materials.

The dark blue and cranberry red colors will be used on flyers, literature, ribbons, and other materials used to promote victims' rights and services among the general public during National Crime Victims' Rights Week. The colors and theme, as well as the NCVRW logo and mission statement, will also be incorporated into the 2009 Victims' Memorial Quilt, tablecloths and napkins, and giveaways.

We will use the customizable posters and other materials in the 2009 NCVRW Resource Guide to incorporate the NCVRW theme and colors into our printed materials, such as flyers, invitations, brochures, bookmarks, and posters. We will disseminate the Resource Guide to our collaborative partners, and use the guide to obtain information on victimization, statistics, and special event ideas.

All project activities, including outreach and promotion, will be geared toward victims of all types of crimes, including but not limited to the following: domestic violence, sexual assault, child sexual and physical abuse, homicide, drunk driving, elder abuse, stalking, identity theft, etc.

We will utilize the support and technical assistance provided by NAVAA in planning and implementing NCVRW CAP projects. Enhancements and refinements to our proposed activities will occur as we collaborate with our partners during the planning and implementation phases.

e. List all project cosponsors/collaborative organizations and briefly describe each's contribution to this specific project (do not discuss overall or general support to the agency or community victim services (300 words).

The County of Tulare, District Attorney's Office Victim Witness Advocacy staff will collaborate with several other local organizations with regard to Victims' Right Week projects. This will allow us to reach a broader audience within the community.

Project staff works closely with a multitude of service agencies, including Mothers Against Drunk Driving, Family Service of Tulare County, Rape Crisis Center, Domestic Violence Shelters, Child Protective Services, and Lindsay and Woodlake Healthy Start programs. These agencies will help distribute information regarding Victims' Rights Week activities, as well as victims' services in general, to members of the community, including potential victims and their families. Other partners for this project will include public officials, Probation, Corrections, Family Court, and local businesses.

Family Services of Tulare County, which operates the battered women's shelter and the rape crisis response program, will participate with our Victim Witness Advocacy staff in candlelight vigils and other activities. Visalia Emergency Aid and other service providers will also participate in outreach efforts. We will also work with local high schools, community colleges, and allied professionals to disseminate information. Local law enforcement agencies will display ribbons on their patrol car antennas during Victims' Rights Week.

Local businesses and other service organizations will serve as cosponsors and/or contribute to the specific projects funded through this grant. For example, they may serve as sponsors or donate food for the ceremony to recognize the programs and individuals who have gone above and beyond to assist victims of crime.

Community support for this project is demonstrated by the number and variety of organizations that we will collaborate with. Other service organizations will donate staff time. We are in the process of seeking specific commitments from partners, as well as donations from local businesses for items such as facility space and refreshments.

Victims and survivors will take an active role in development and implementation of activities during Victims' Right Week. They will serve as guest speakers at candlelight vigils, ceremonies, and other events throughout the County, providing testimonials, information, and support for others in the community. We will include victims and their family members in the planning and implementation of outreach and other activities, as well as public service announcements and newspaper articles, as they are representative of the target population.

As the general population of Tulare County is diverse, it is vital that activities and services be culturally and linguistically appropriate. Approximately 56% of the County population is Hispanic, and 46% speaks a language other than English at home. As the large Hispanic population throughout the County is also indicative of our victim population, and therefore our target population, all outreach and materials will be in both Spanish and English. Spanish speaking Victim Witness Advocates will also be available. The elderly and children will also be specifically targeted through outreach efforts.

The annual Victims' Memorial Quilt Unveiling Ceremony is held in conjunction with Victims' Rights Week. Families who have lost a family member through homicide or drunk driving submit a quilt square commemorating the life of their loved one. Each year, between 16 and 24 squares are created. The squares are crafted together to form a memorial quilt, which is unveiled at a ceremony that includes testimonials from family members and words of comfort from various public officials. Stories will demonstrate how victims' services and compensation has helped local residents. This evening of dedication and remembrance allows the victims' family members to meet and provide support for each other. The surviving family members are very involved in planning the ceremony and related activities, as well as setting up for the event.
