Adopt a resolution recognizing the animal rendering industry as a critical and irreplaceable support service to the dairy industry.

SUMMARY:

Tulare County leads the nation in the production of dairy products with milk and milk products valued at more than \$1.79 Billion in 2008. Tulare County's dairy, cattle, and other livestock industries are among the most-valued of the many agricultural commodities produced.

The animal rendering industry is a vital support service to the dairy industry. The animal rendering industry converts animal by-products and food waste into commercial commodities such as high-protein ingredients for livestock feed and pet food, and tallow, a valuable ingredient in soaps, paints, cosmetics, and more.

There are not adequate alternative disposal options for the industries and public that depend on critical and timely rendering services. During the heat wave of July 2007, Tulare County was forced to find alternative disposal methods when the rendering industry was unable to provide adequate services and it became apparent that adequate capacity is an issue in the event of a catastrophic emergency. The rendering industry has been further impacted by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA)

"Enhanced Feed Ban" ruling, increasing the cost for the rendering and livestock industries during very difficult economic conditions. If renderers suspend disposal service for farms, it could create an ongoing emergency situation for all impacted industries in Tulare County, as there is no other approved disposal alternative.

In rural communities, such as Tulare County, when regulations and fees increase, rural landowners often see an increase in illegal dumping of trash, waste materials and livestock carcasses. Illegal dumping on rural roads and on private properties increases health risks for humans and our environment.

Renderers are stewards of the environment utilizing all the byproducts of the deceased animals limiting the amount of waste material through a highly efficient and economical recycling of products.
